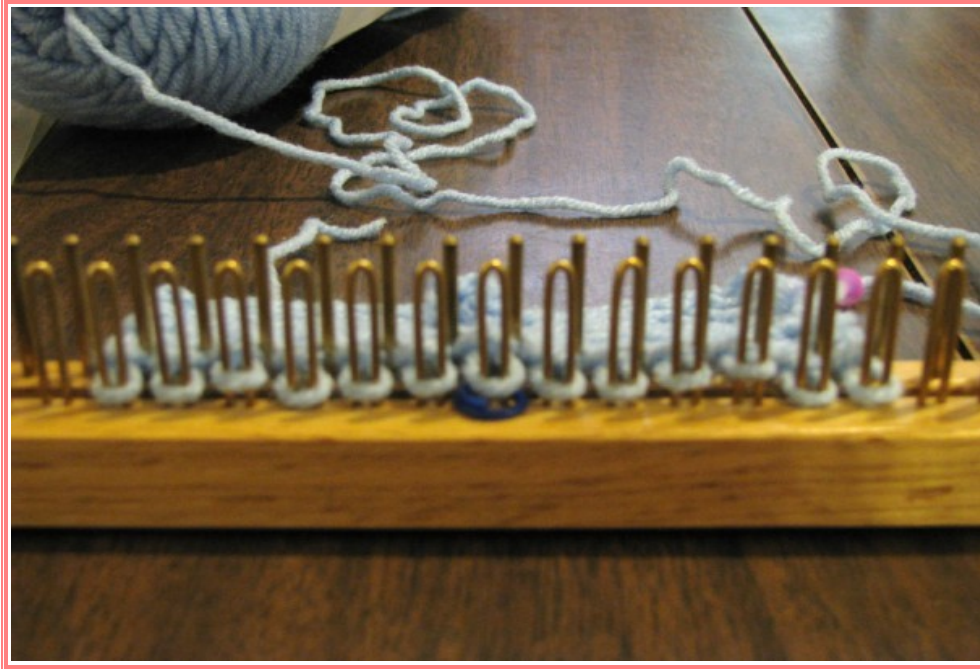
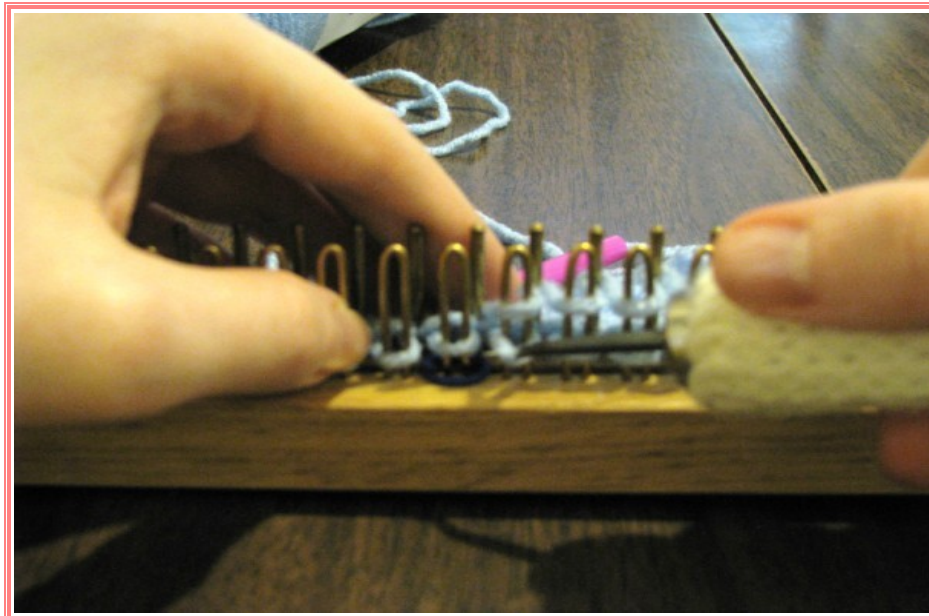


This example was done with one strand of yarn on the Kiss Loom (first setting + 5 washers). I previously set up the loom, wrapping 13 pegs. We will be creating the bobble on the middle peg, so I placed a stitch marker around the peg so that you will see where we will be doing the stitch.

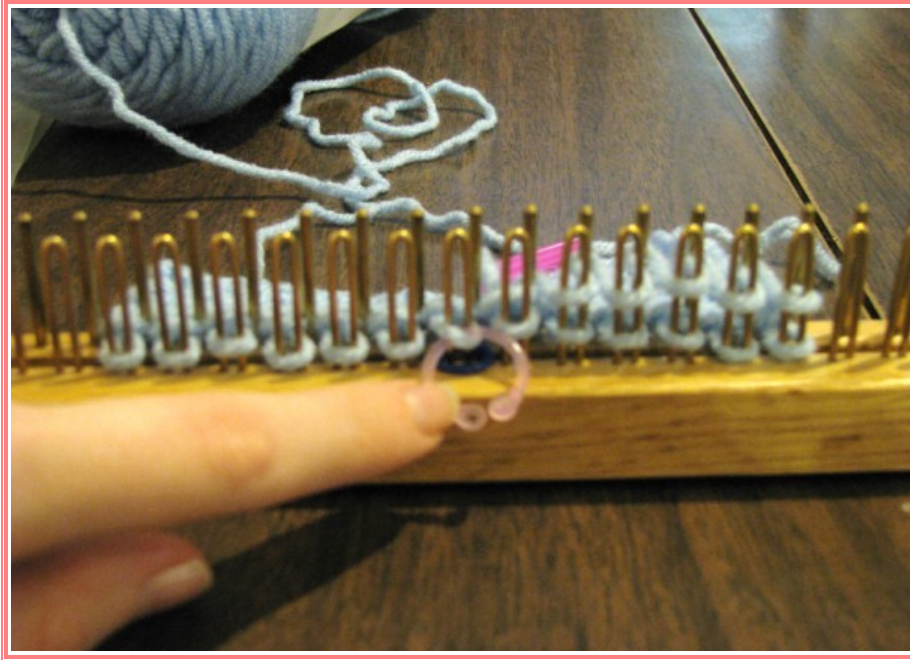


Step 1: Go ahead and continuous u-wrap or continuous purl up to the peg before the one you have your stitch marker on. Knit off that last peg you wrapped before the marker to hold the yarn down.

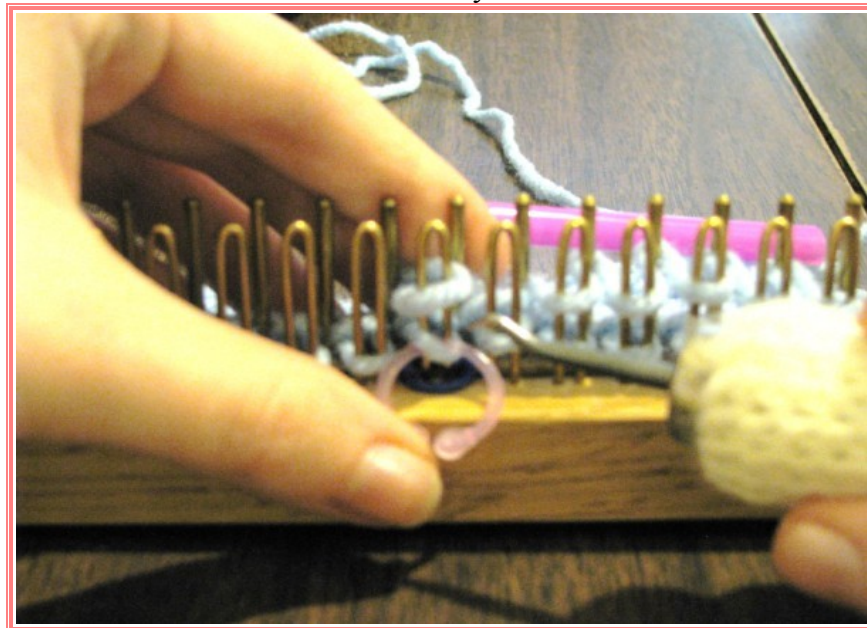


Picture illustrates me, knitting off the peg before the marker.

Step 2: Place a stitch marker on the loop that is on the peg where bobble is to be created.



Step 3: You will e-wrap and knit off this peg (do not do anything with the pins..just the peg) the specified amount from the pattern. In this example, we will e-wrap and knit off 6 times. NOTE: Since the pegs on the Kiss Looms are not thick like the ones on a Knifty Knitter Loom you will need to wrap loosely

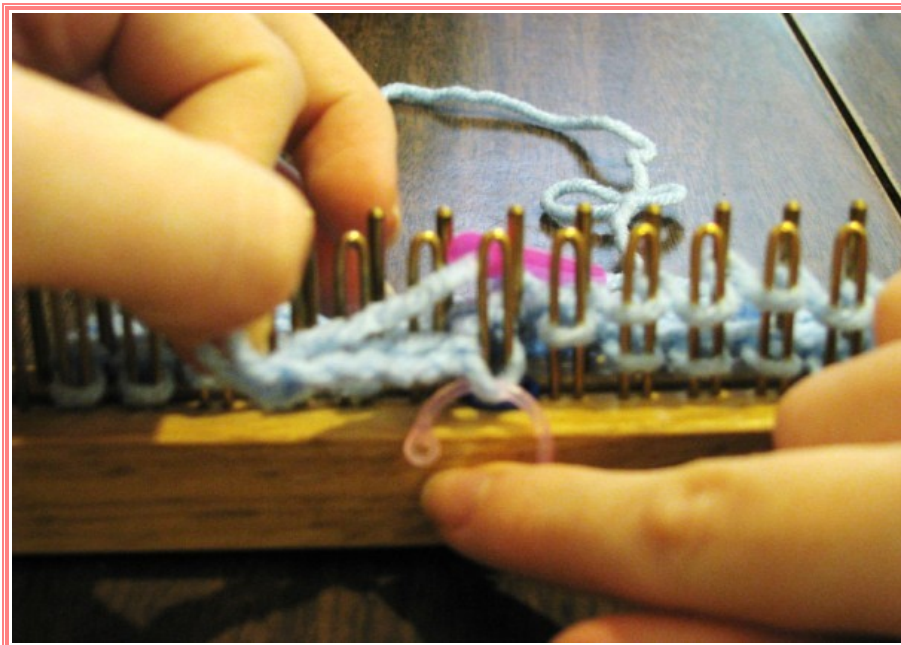


Picture illustrates how loosely I wrapped the pegs.

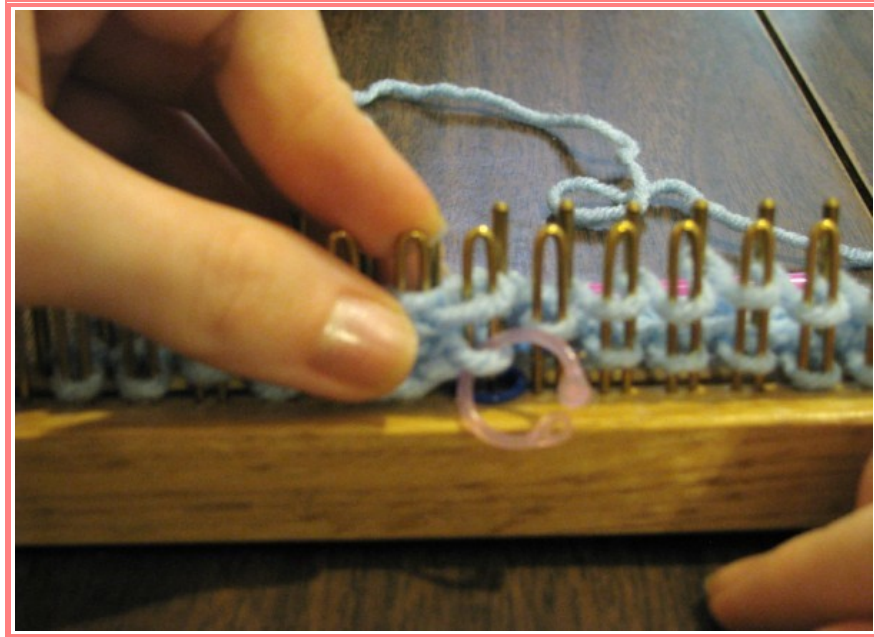
Step 4: After wrapping and knitting of the peg (6 times), you will remove the loop from the peg, holding it in one hand while grabbing the stitch marker you placed in the first loop and pulling this loop back onto the peg. Then place the last loop knitted back onto peg. This will give you two loops on the peg



Picture illustrates me holding the beginning loop with the stitch marker in my right hand and the last loop knitted in my left hand.

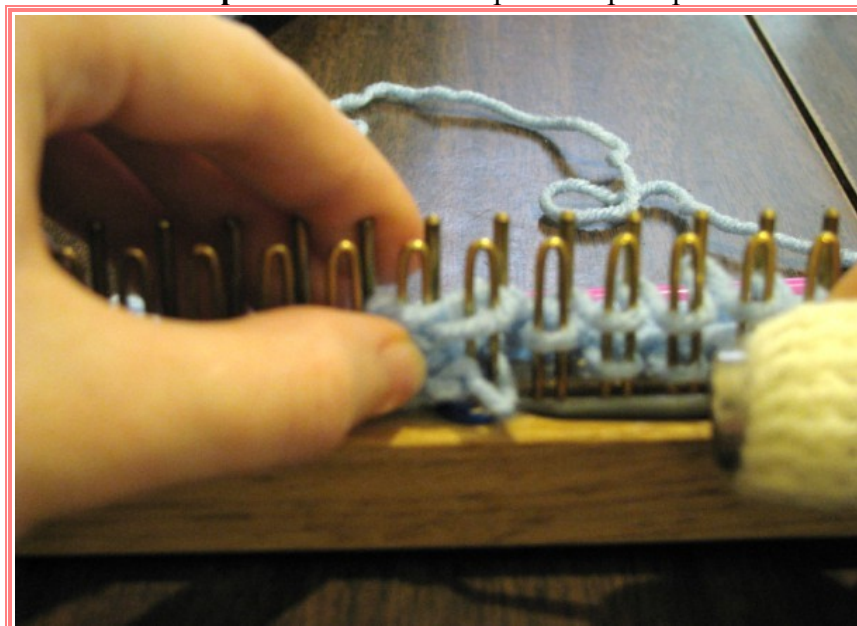


Picture illustrates that I have put the beginning loop with the stitch marker back onto the peg.

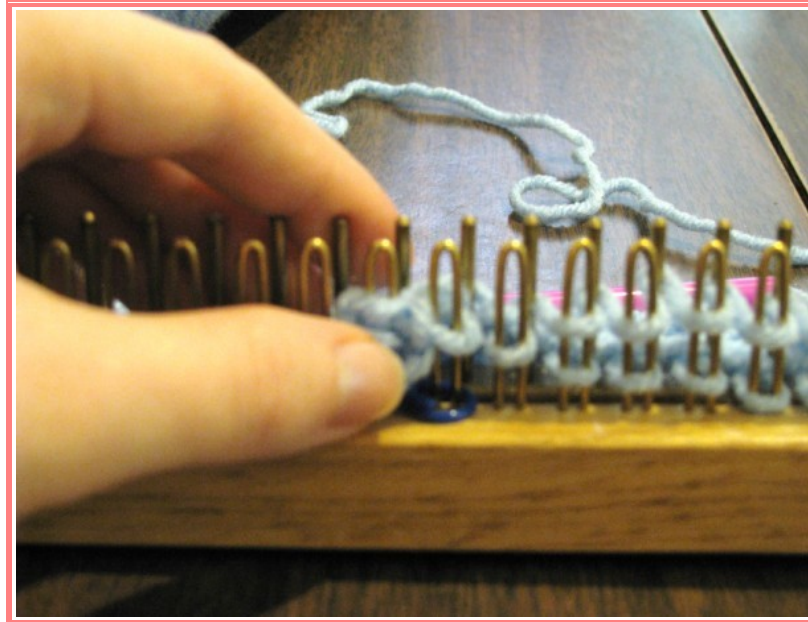


Picture illustrates that I have now placed the last loop knitted back onto the peg and there are two loops on the peg.

Step 5: Knit bottom loop over top loop.

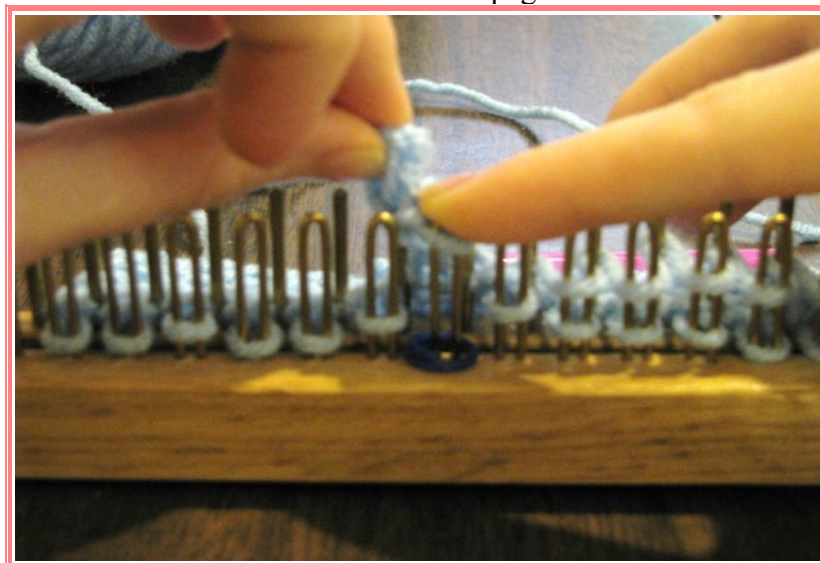


Picture illustrates that I hold the chain of loops to the side with my thumb when I knit off the loop. I have removed the stitch marker at this point.

Step 6: Place your finger on top of the peg to ensure the loop doesn't come off and pull the bobble to the back of the peg.

Picture shows the bobble placed behind the peg and between the pins.

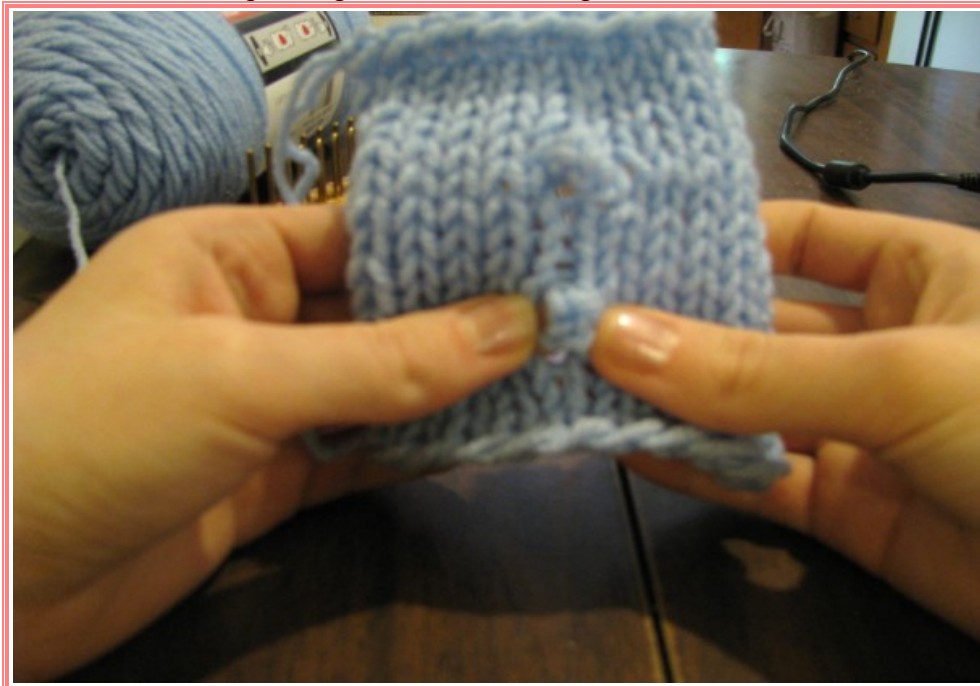
This is what your knitting will look like before you push your bobbles through to the front of the fabric.
